GENERAL PROCUREMENT NOTICE

The Mauritius Ports Authority (MPA), through the Government of the Republic of Mauritius has received a grant from the African Development Bank for the implementation of a preliminary technical study and design of an island terminal and breakwater structure at Port-Louis Harbour. In this respect, the MPA is inviting Expression of Interest from experienced consultancy firms to provide consultancy services for the above project.

The objective of the study is to assess the technical and economic viability of the construction of the island terminal and the breakwater to make the country a regional hub and minimise risk of disruption in port operations, assess the environmental and social soundness and desirability of the project, and provide the Government of Mauritius with a roadmap for the project, including identification and planning of various project preparatory activities.
